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Greetings!

The Justice Speakers Institute (JSI), in collaboration with the American Probation and Parole Association, is delighted to present an opportunity for you to acquire additional knowledge on how to supervise individuals with an Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and/or other Substance Use Disorders (SUD). This in-person training is a comprehensive upgrade to existing OUD training programs, specifically tailored to equip criminal justice professionals with essential information necessary for supervising individuals with this disease.

Criminal justice professionals from across the country will be educated about Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) in a one-day training program. The training utilizes a collaborative learning model where participants learn with a team of subject-matter experts. Several of the sessions involve group discussions, and peer-to-peer learning.

This collaborative learning approach provides attendees with the up-to-date scientific information on the physiological and psychological effects of substance use disorders and recovery, enabling the attendees to make informed decisions when supervising or monitoring individuals with an OUD.

A variety of topics related to OUD and MOUD will be discussed, including:

- the effects of substance use disorders;
- recovery on the brain and body;
- stigma and patient rights;
- evidence-based screening and assessment for OUD;
- outcomes of MOUD for criminal justice populations;



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- relapse management; and,
- the role of MOUD in long-term recovery.

During the training program, attendees will gain knowledge about the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and its impact upon individuals who are receiving MOUD. The ADA mandates government agencies to make reasonable accommodations for people with disabilities, including those on MOUD. Attendees will also learn supervision best practices while monitoring individuals suffering from OUD.

Before participating, attendees will complete a survey to assess their knowledge and attitudes towards OUD and MOUD.
